

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION: THE THIRD SACRAMENT

If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.

—John 20:23

You probably have noticed that Confession and Absolution has changed in the Divine Service lately. We are no longer using the left-hand column on page 184 in the hymnal but have rather switched to the other option on the right. For the last few years, we've been doing this during the season of Advent, but for the foreseeable future, we will continue to do so.

The left-hand column, which I will now refer to as the "General Absolution," has been a staple among Lutherans ever since it was first introduced in the Lutheran Hymnal in 1941. We are so accustomed to this rite that to lose it seems quite jarring and just plain wrong. My goal in the next few newsletter articles is to explain why I, as your pastor, have made the difficult decision to no longer use the General Absolution but instead have opted to use the right-hand column, which is normally called the "Declaration of Grace."

At the get-go, please know that I did not make this decision in haste. For the last couple years, I have taught on this topic in Bible Study, preached about it from the pulpit, wrote on it in a previous newsletter article, discussed it with area pastors and our Board of Elders. After much study and prayerful consideration, my conscience is bound, as I believe that this change is most faithful to God's Word. I am more than willing to discuss my reasons for making this change with anyone who desires it, but for right now, here is the main reason:

As our Lutheran Confessions teach us, Holy Absolution is the "third sacrament" (Large Catechism, IV: 74), the other two being Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. Along with the Word of God, these three sacraments are the means of grace, that is, they are the ways in which God conveys his grace towards sinners, the avenues by which he delivers to us that which Christ accomplished in his atoning death on the cross. Without these means, we aren't able to receive the forgiveness of sins which was won for us by Jesus over two thousand years ago.

The first and primary means of grace is God's Word. The Word of God is "the power of God for salvation" (Romans 1:16), for "faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17). Simply put, without God's Word we cannot believe in Jesus and be saved. Also, without the Word of God, the sacraments would do us no good, for Baptism would be just plain water and the Lord's Supper only bread and wine. The Word of God makes the sacrament a sacrament. It gives it the power and ability to deliver the forgiveness of sins through visible means.

One of the key differences between the Word and the sacraments is to whom they are given. The Word is given to all people, but the sacraments are only for Christians. Think of the Parable of the Sower (Luke 8:4-8). Jesus says that the sower threw his seed all over the place, on both bad soil and good soil. He didn't care where it landed, just as long as it landed everywhere. As our Lord teaches us, the seed is the Word of God and the sower is the preacher. The preacher is to proclaim God's Word to all people, whether they will believe it or not, because the Word of God has the power to change the hearts of men, to soften hardened hearts, and to turn unbelievers into believers. Therefore, the seed of God's Word can be thrown everywhere.

But handing out the sacraments is parallel to taking one seed and planting it into one heart. Or another way to put it, the preaching of the Gospel is like a person telling you, "Your wife loves you," while the sacraments are if your wife stood in front of you and said, "I love you." A sacrament takes what the Gospel proclaims to the whole world and applies it you personally.

Both the Word and the sacraments offer the same benefit—the forgiveness of sins, but they offer it in different ways and to different people. Again, the Word is given through preaching and teaching to both a group or an individual, whereas the sacraments are only given to individuals through water (Baptism), the pastor's voice (Absolution), and bread and wine (the Lord's Supper). The sacraments aren't meant to be given to all people but only those who have heard the Word and believed it. Faith is needed to receive the benefits of any sacrament.

For this reason, we shouldn't baptize an atheist or commune a Muslim. This would not only be an irresponsible use of God's gifts but also harmful to the recipient. This also means that we shouldn't give Absolution to those outside of the faith, as Luther's Catechism teaches that pastors are to "withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent."

The sacraments require pastoral oversight. They aren't to be administered willy-nilly to whomever walks in the door. This is why Christ instituted the Office of the Holy Ministry, so that pastors could serve as "stewards of the mysteries of God" (1 Corinthians 4:1). Sure enough, the means of grace are God's gifts, his mysteries, but he has called pastors to be the ones to oversee the administration of these gifts, so that they are given to those in faith for their benefit and not their detriment, as our Lutheran Confessions teach: "So that we may obtain this faith, the ministry of teaching the gospel and administering the sacraments was instituted" (Augsburg Confession, Article V). We will discuss more about the Office of the Ministry and the pastor's role in the administration of the sacraments, particularly Holy Absolution, in a future newsletter article.

For now, this is the main reason why I have decided to forego using the General Absolution, because the sacrament of Absolution is never "general," that is, it can't be handed out to a group of people. The Sacrament of Holy Absolution, like Baptism and the Lord's Supper, can only be delivered to an individual.

The Declaration of Grace on page 184 in the hymnal is more or less a mini sermon, in which the promise of the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to the whole congregation: "Almighty God, our heavenly Father, has had mercy upon us and has given His only Son to die for us and for His sake forgives us all our sins." By means of this declaration, the forgiveness of sins is delivered to all who believe. And yet, so that we might be more certain of this forgiveness, our Lord instituted the sacraments, in which a person can receive this forgiveness for himself as an individual, as he hears it said: "I baptize you" and "I forgive you" and "The body of Christ for you."

I am no longer comfortable speaking the words of Absolution to a group of people: "I forgive you all your sins," just as I would not be comfortable splashing water over a group of people and saying, "I baptize all of you." Such words are reserved for Private Absolution, as the Christian Church has historically practiced it and as our Lutheran Confessions, including the Small Catechism, teach us.

As I stated before, I am more than happy to discuss this further with whomever wishes. I didn't make this change without prayerful consideration and much study. May God continue to guide us by his Word that we would be ever faithful with his gifts, the means of grace, whereby he forgives us our sins and reassures us of his mercy. The next newsletter article will look at what Luther teaches about Confession and Absolution in his Small Catechism.

What is Gesimatide?

The two major feast days in the Church Year are Christmas and Easter. These two celebrations shape and form much of what we do on a Sunday morning. Often times, we are either preparing for one of those special days or looking back on it. For example, Advent prepares us for Christmas, whereas Epiphany looks back on Christmas. On January 21st, we completed our look-back on Christmas with the observance of our Lord's Transfiguration. Now, we begin our preparations for Easter.

We prepare for our Lord's resurrection in four steps: Pre-Lent, Lent, Passiontide, and Holy Week.

On Sunday, January 28th, we began the season of Pre-Lent, also called Gesimatide. This is a time to transition our hearts and minds away from the celebration of Christmas and Epiphany and into the penitential season of Lent, our forty-day journey to Jerusalem, where we will see our Savior suffer and die and rise again.

Gesimatide gets its name from the Sundays of the season: Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima. These names give us a rough countdown until Easter. Gesima means "days," and what comes before it is a number: Septuagesima (70 days), Sexagesima (60 days), Quinquagesima (50 days). Ash Wednesday can also be called Quadragesima (40 days).

The main theme of Gesimatide is focused on the grace of God, a wonderful theme to prepare us for Lent and for the grace we will see in our Lord's passion. Septuagesima teaches us that God's grace is undeserved, as we hear of the goodness of the landowner who gives the same paycheck to all of his laborers, even if they only worked one hour (Matthew 20:1-16). Sexagesima shows us that God's grace can only be received and not earned, just as the sower's seed is received by the soil and, from it, produces a harvest a hundredfold (Luke 8:4-15). And finally on Quinquagesima, we see that God's grace is not easily understood, just as the disciples can't seem to grasp it, and yet a blind beggar from Jericho does, as he cries out to Jesus: "Son of David, have mercy on me" (Mark 10:32-34, 46-52).

The grace of God is what leads us to recognize our sin and repent of it, that we might receive such grace through his Word and Sacrament, rejoicing that our Lord who once was dead now lives.





In anticipation of our congregation's 75th anniversary in November 2024, we will have a hymn chosen for the month that will be used during the Divine Service. The hymns of the church give God's people the words to sing his praises and to confess what he has done for them in the saving death and resurrection of his Son Jesus Christ.

Kyrie! God, Father LSB 942

"Lord (Kyrie) have mercy (eleison)." It's something the sick would often cry out to Jesus, as they begged for his help. When we as Christians ask for God's mercy, we acknowledge that we also are beggars who are in continual need before our Creator.

We pray the Kyrie every Sunday after the Introit and before the Gloria in Excelsis. For the month of February and throughout the season of Lent, we will replace the normal Kyrie with this version, which has been used by Christians since the 9th century.

This Kyrie addresses each person of the Trinity beginning with the Father who abounds in gracious love. God the Father not only made us, knitting us together in our mother's womb, but he continues to preserve us by giving us what we need every day at the proper time.

Next, we cry out to Christ, our king, who has brought salvation to all through his death and resurrection. And now, seated at the Father's right hand, he continues to intercede for us as the mediator between God and men.

The Holy Spirit's job is to take what the Son has done and give it to each of us personally by faith. We pray that he would guard our faith, for without the Spirit, we would lose it. Through the means of grace, we are indeed kept in the faith until our life's last hour. As those who die in Christ, who die with saving faith, we can leave this sinful world with gladness.

Kyrie! God, Father in heav'n above, You abound in gracious love, Of all things the maker and preserver. Eleison! Eleison!

Kyrie! O Christ, our king,
Salvation for all You came to bring.
O Lord Jesus, God's own Son,
Our mediator at the heav'nly throne:
Hear our cry and grant our supplication.
Eleison! Eleison!

Kyrie! O God the Holy Ghost, Guard our faith, the gift we need the most, And bless our life's last hour, That we leave this sinful world with gladness. Eleison! Eleison!
