

MARRIAGE MONTH

[Jesus said:] Have you not read that he who created them from the beginning made them male and female, and said, "Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh"? So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate.

-Matthew 19:4-6

The month of June is filled with rainbows but for all the wrong reasons. God first put his colorful sign in the sky after the great flood waters receded, promising to Noah and the whole world that "never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of the flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth" (Genesis 9:11). Such a symbol filled with hope and promise has been stolen away from the Creator and used by his beloved creatures to promote wickedness, which goes directly against his perfect design.

In the beginning, God made us male and female and established the institution of marriage between a man and a woman, joining them together in such a mysterious way that they were no longer two but one flesh. However, mankind has done its best to redesign what the Lord of heaven and earth has made. Not only has the world given a new definition to marriage, but it can't even tell you what a woman is. And those who support the alphabet soup of sexual sins also have no problem killing babies, because when it comes down to it, homosexuality, transgenderism, and abortion are all interrelated. All of them are an attack on marriage. And an attack on marriage is an attack on its designer: God.

For all this, the month of June can be a very frustrating month for Christians. "Pride Parades" fill the streets, even in small towns throughout the Thumb. Rainbow flags are waved from neighborhood homes. The culture's message will be heard on the radio and seen on TV with commercials galore. And just about every major corporation changes their logo for the month, taking our Lord's colors to encourage the world's wicked ways. We can become so frustrated that we begin to loathe the rainbow entirely and all that it stands for.

But we can't do that, because the rainbow doesn't belong to the world. It is the Lord's, which means it is also yours. It is a symbol not of pride but of promise. It comes from the God of love, who loves the world in this way—He gave his only begotten Son. He created the world and everything in it, and as his creatures, we are called upon to love what he has given us and promote the goodness therein.

During the month of June here at Grace, we will be celebrating Marriage Month. The goal is not only to fight back against the culture but also to promote the goodness of God's creation in holy marriage. We not only speak against homosexuality, but we must also show the good in the lifelong union between one man and one woman. We don't just argue against transgenderism, but we teach the beautiful distinctions between men and women and how God has designed each gender for certain purposes in life. We are not simply anti-abortion, but we are more importantly pro-life, as we deem every human being as precious in the eyes of the One who knit us together in our mother's womb.

During this month, let's not simply point out the world's probelms, as we certainly should, but let us also show the world what is so wonderful about what God has made. Let us promote marriage.

A large banner will be standing in our church's front lawn (pictured below) with the true meaning behind the rainbow. Each Sunday, the sermon will focus on how we as Christians must respond to the world's hostility. And that same morning's Bible Study will look at the three major sins committed against marriage (homosexuality, transgenderism, and abortion) and how we as Christians can witness to our friends, family, and neighbors.


Now is not the time to remain silent on these issues, to turn a blind eye, or simply "agree to disagree." We can't be afraid to speak the truth. If you truly love your neighbor—your son or daughter, your best friend, or co-worker—you will tell them the truth, even if it stings, because only the truth will set them free (John 8:36). Only the Son of God, who became bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh, who gave himself up for the world and united himself to the Church in such a mysterious way so that we are no longer two but one flesh, only this Son can set a person free. In the end, that's whom the world is after. When they attack marriage and the gifts that flow from it, they are attacking our Bridegroom and the salvation he won from the cross. Therefore if we give in to the world's desecration of marriage, then we are also allowing the Gospel to be defiled.

These are difficult and uncomfortable times to be a Christian, times that require courage and perseverance. We place our confidence not in the opinions of men but in the truth of God's Word. Keep this Word, hold it sacred, and gladly hear and learn it. And then confess it to a world that wants to silence it.

"But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame" (1 Peter 3:14-16).

O Lord, Look Down from Heaven, Behold

Martin Luther prepared his hymn "O Lord, Look Down from Heaven, Behold" late in the year 1523 as a setting of Psalm 12. Its first extant appearance in print was in the first Lutheran hymnal, the Achtliederbuch of 1524.


While Luther's paraphrase closely follows the text of the Psalm on which it is based, Luther is quick to apply the ancient Psalm to his own day. The plaintive cry of the Psalmist is applied to conditions during the early days of the Reformation, when it was by no means certain that the Evangelical doctrine would survive the attacks and persecutions of Rome. The "flattering lips" and "proud tongues" of the Psalm become the false teachers of Luther's day, who deceive the people into accepting the doctrine of salvation by works, and who impress the simple with their outward show of learning.

Luther's hymn remains very fitting for the Church to sing today, especially during the month of June when the wicked ways of the world are being promoted as acceptable and good. Our society teaches "a false and idle word which their own wits have founded" and "each seeks in his own way to guide." This perfectly describes our world that has thwarted the truth and replaced it with each person's own "personal truth."

In response to this, God says, "I must arise." He hears the cries, sighs, and lamentation of his people, and he continues to be with us in his saving Word that "shall fight [His] foes with might and main, the poor with strength upholding." God's Word alone will be our weapon and shield. It will proclaim the truth to a world of lies, and it will defend God's people from falling prey.

One Thing's Needful LSB 536

When Jesus was invited over for dinner, Martha was very busy in the kitchen preparing the meal, while her sister Mary sat at our Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. This greatly upset Martha who thought her sister ought to be helping her get things ready, to which Jesus responded, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:41).

The one thing needful is Christ. Without him, we have nothing and are nothing. Without him, we are still dead in our trespasses and sins. Without him, we have no joy or pleasure. We look for happiness in all the wrong places, contentment in the things of this world. But they will not do, because "beneath it the heart is still fretting and striving, no true, lasting happiness ever deriving." Only in Jesus do we find everything we could possibly want or need. "Nothing have I, Christ, to offer, You alone, my highest good. Nothing have I, Lord, to proffer but Your crimson-colored blood."

We are anxious and troubled about many things, but only one thing is necessary: Jesus. You could have all the worldly treasures your heart might desire, but without him, you are still poor. And yet with him and his promises, you are the richest person on the face of the plant, no matter how much you have stored away in a bank account. "This one thing is needful; all others are vain—I count all but loss that I Christ may obtain!" Jesus is the good portion, which will not be taken away from you.





WITHOUT THE SHEDDING OF BLOOD by David P. Scaer

Antinomianism has taken root within Lutheran circles. This branch of Gnosticism substitutes the totality of Scripture and the accepted doctrine of norma normans with the Gospel as a selective carveout. Consequently, the Antinomians relegate any Scripture with a supposed insufficiency of the Gospel to a lesser status, perhaps on par with the Book of Concord.

The Antinomian infection is visible in theologian Gerhard Forde's infamous aphorism, "The answer to the question why doesn't God just forgive sins is, He does!" For Forde and his acolytes, the forgiveness of sins (and everything that precedes and follows from that forgiveness) happens in the mind of God and has no material reality. This idea converts Christ's vicarious atonement into a fiction that is little more than a drama staged by God for our benefit. This idea is a startling contrast to Hebrews 9:7-22, which teaches that there is no forgiveness without blood - non sine sanguine.
