

# THE CATECHISM

As I begin another cycle of teaching the catechism to our children here at Grace, I'm once again reminded that this book isn't just for children. In fact, it can't be. If that's all the catechism is—a textbook for kids—then we've lost the whole point of Martin Luther's initial intent and, even more so, we despise the Word of God. The catechism wasn't written for children. It was written for Christians, from the cradle to the grave.

Read below these words of Martin Luther taken from his preface to the Large Catechism and examine your own life and your use of his catechism. We all must admit that we can do better. And we must do better.

Many regard the catechism as a simple, trifle teaching, which they can absorb and master at one reading and then toss the book into a corner as if they are ashamed to read it again....What they need, however, is to become children and begin to learn the ABCs, which they think they have long since outgrown.

I beg such lazy bellies and presumptuous saints, for God's sake, to let themselves be convinced and believe that they are not really and truly such learned and exalted doctors as they think. I implore them not ever to imagine that they have learned these parts of the catechism perfectly, or that they know them sufficiently, even though they think they know them ever so well.

Nothing is so powerfully effective against the devil, the world, the flesh, and all evil thoughts as to occupy one's self with God's Word, to speak about it and meditate upon it, in the way that Psalm 1 calls those blessed who "meditate on God's law day and night." Without doubt, you will offer up no more powerful incense or savor against the devil than to occupy yourself with God's commandments and words and to speak, sing, or think about them. Indeed, this is the true holy water and sign that drives away the devil and puts him to flight.

Let all Christians drill themselves in the catechism daily, and constantly put it into practice, guarding themselves with the greatest care and diligence against the poisonous infection of such security or arrogance. Let them constantly read and teach, learn and meditate and ponder. Let them never stop until they have proved by experience and are certain that they have taught the devil to death and have become more learned than God himself and all the saints....Then in due time they will make the noble confession that the longer they work with the catechism, the less they know of it, and the more they have to learn.

Turn and become a child, as Jesus commands us (Matthew 18:3), and relearn the catechism. Take it to heart. Read and meditate on it every day, as a portion is given for you to memorize every week from the Family Altar Sheet. And come to Sunday morning Bible Study, where we will take some time to study Luther's Large Catechism. Repent and once again "long for the pure, spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation" (1 Peter 2:2).

In anticipation of our congregation's 75th anniversary in November 2024, we will have a hymn chosen for the month that will be used during the Divine Service. The hymns of the church give God's people the words to sing his praises and to confess what he has done for them in the saving death and resurrection of his Son Jesus Christ.

# Lord Jesus Christ, the Church's Head LSB 647

Jesus is "the head of the body, the church" (Colossians 1:18). The body is nothing without a head, so also the Church is nothing without Christ. He is our rock upon which we stand.

Johann Mentzer (1658-1734) beautifully encapsulates all that in this hymn, in which we cry out to Jesus to hear and help his Church on earth (stanza 1).

We are united in Christ, whose name we confess, as he continues to care for us through his Word and Sacraments, in which we find our only strength and comfort (stanza 2).

Having been strengthened and comforted by such gifts, we ask that Jesus would us serve him evermore "with hearts both pure and lowly," as we live in repentance, destroying the power of sin and annoying evils (stanza 3).

And finally, we pray that we would sacrifice all else for the sake of the Gospel, bearing our blessed cross with steadfastness in both joy and distress, lest we forsake the Lord. In the end, we ask that we would partake of endless joy and gladness with Christ in heaven (stanza 4).

This hymn is meant not only for individual Christians but for the Church as a whole. We are in this together, as the one body of Christ, and together we sing and pray these words.

- 1 Lord Jesus Christ, the Church's head,
  You are her one foundation;
  In You she trusts, before You bows,
  And waits for Your salvation.
  Built on this rock secure,
  Your Church shall endure
  Though all the world decay
  And all things pass away.
  O hear, O hear us, Jesus!
- 2 O Lord, let this Your little flock, Your name alone confessing, Continue in Your loving care, True unity possessing.
  Your sacraments, O Lord, And Your saving Word
  To us, Lord, pure retain.
  Grant that they may remain
  Our only strength and comfort.
- 3 Help us to serve You evermore
  With hearts both pure and lowly;
  And may Your Word, that light divine,
  Shine on in splendor holy
  That we repentance show,
  In faith ever grow;
  The pow'r of sin destroy
  And evils that annoy.
  O make us faithful Christians.
- 4 And for Your Gospel let us dare
  To sacrifice all treasure;
  Teach us to bear Your blessèd cross,
  To find in You all pleasure.
  O grant us steadfastness
  In joy and distress,
  Lest we, Lord, You forsake.
  Let us by grace partake
  Of endless joy and gladness.



When the bread and wine are consecrated (set apart) by the Words of Institution, they are no longer ordinary bread and wine, but we believe that in, with, and under such food and drink is the true and physical body and blood of the God-man Jesus Christ. The body he gave and the blood he shed on the cross have been resurrected and are now given for us to eat and to drink, so that his death and resurrection might be our very own.

Therefore, the pastor doesn't only lift up bread and a cup of wine, but he is lifting up Christ himself for all to see and adore. This food is the Bread of Life who came down from heaven (John 6:35). It is the most sacred gift God has given to us, and so if anything is to be elevated among us, it is this food, our Lord Jesus.

The pastor not only lifts up the body and blood of Christ, but he also lowers himself by genuflecting (bowing with the knee) in worship, even as the congregation can bow in reverence toward our Lord on the altar. This simple gesture is a great confession of what we believe we receive in the Sacrament. This food isn't a symbol of our Lord's body and blood, and we don't merely remember his death. But by eating this bread and drinking this cup, we eat and drink the very body and blood of Jesus, proclaiming his death until he comes (1 Corinthians 11:26).





With courses using the "great books" of the past for the core curriculum, the college will offer Latin, history, theology, literature, logic, rhetoric, music, geometry, biology, and mathematics, all within a purposefully Christian and Lutheran framework. 
