

CANDLEMAS

My eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel

—Luke 2:30-32

Forty days after Jesus was born, he and his parents went to the temple in Jerusalem in order to fulfill the law of Moses. As the firstborn son in his earthly family, Mary's child was presented to God, and payment was made to redeem his life, as the life of every firstborn Israelite first belonged to the Lord (Exodus 13:2; Numbers 18:15-16). Joseph and his wife did exactly what their forefathers had done for centuries, knowing full well that all of the Old Testament payments and sacrifices would be fulfilled in the once for all availing sacrifice of God's first and only begotten Son on the cross, the very reason this child was born.

We will hear more of this account on February 2nd, as we celebrate the Presentation of Our Lord & the Purification of Mary, forty days after we celebrated Christmas on December 25th. On that holy day, one of the ancient traditions of the Christian Church is to bless the candles used in the church's sanctuary throughout the coming year. Part of the reason for this has to do with the fact that, while the Holy Family was in the temple, a man named Simeon, who was waiting for the consolation of Israel, took the child Jesus in his arms and blessed him saying, "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel" (Luke 2:29-32). Jesus is the Light of the World, who scatters the darkness of our broken hearts and enlightens us with the glory of his Father.

This is why we light candles in our sanctuary. We don't do it to illuminate the room so that we can read the bulletin better, but rather, the candles, just like most of the other items in the sanctuary, are meant to teach us something about our God and Lord. His Word and Sacraments are the means by which the Holy Spirit enlightens us, forgiving us of our very dark transgressions and opening our eyes to see God's salvation in his Son, that we might "cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light" (Romans 13:12). Thus, the sanctuary candles teach us that Christ is the Light of the World (John 8:12), and by receiving him in faith, we too are such a light to the world (Matthew 5:14).

Since this feast falls on a Sunday this year, we will follow the tradition of our forefathers with a blessing of the candles. By the Word of God and prayer, our candles will be set apart as a teaching tool for all of us, reminding us of God's Light, who continues to reveal himself to us. This ceremony will take place at the beginning of the Divine Service in the fellowship hall, after which the congregation will follow the processional cross into the sanctuary with lit candles in their hands, thus complimenting our celebration of Christmas with Candlemas.

What is Gesimatide?

The two major feast days in the Church Year are Christmas and Easter. These two celebrations shape and form much of what we do on a Sunday morning. Often times, we are either preparing for one of those special days or looking back on it. For example, Advent prepares us for Christmas, whereas Epiphany looks back on Christmas. On February 9th, we will complete our look-back on Christmas with the observance of our Lord's Transfiguration, which will then begin our preparations for Easter.

We prepare for our Lord's resurrection in four steps: Pre-Lent, Lent, Passiontide, and Holy Week.

On Sunday, February 16th, we began the season of Pre-Lent, also called Gesimatide. This is a time to transition our hearts and minds away from the celebration of Christmas and Epiphany and into the penitential season of Lent, our forty-day journey to Jerusalem, where we will see our Savior suffer and die and rise again.

Gesimatide gets its name from the Sundays of the season: Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima. These names give us a rough countdown until Easter. Gesima means "days," and what comes before it is a number: Septuagesima (70 days), Sexagesima (60 days), Quinquagesima (50 days). Ash Wednesday can also

be called Quadragesima (40 days).

The main theme of Gesimatide is focused on the grace of God, a wonderful theme to prepare us for Lent and for the grace we will see in our Lord's passion. Septuagesima teaches us that God's grace is undeserved, as we hear of the goodness of the landowner who gives the same paycheck to all of his laborers, even if they only worked one hour (Matthew 20:1-16). Sexagesima shows us that God's grace can only be received and not earned, just as the sower's seed is received by the soil and, from it, produces a harvest a hundredfold (Luke 8:4-15). And finally on Quinquagesima, we see that God's grace is not easily understood, just as the disciples can't seem to grasp it, and yet a blind beggar from Jericho does, as he cries out to Jesus: "Son of David, have mercy on me" (Mark 10:32-34, 46-52).

The grace of God is what leads us to recognize our sin and repent of it, that we might receive such grace through his Word and Sacrament, rejoicing that our Lord who once was dead now lives.


