

YOU'RE WEIRD

And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance. ...And all were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others mocking said, "They are filled with new wine."

—Acts 2:4, 12-13

From the very beginning, the Christian Church has been mocked for being different. When the disciples received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and were given the ability to speak in different languages (signifying that the Gospel was to be preached to all nations), the people mocked them. They mocked them for being different.

This mockery would continue past Pentecost, even into our own present day. Christians have always been mocked. We're mocked for believing in one God who is also three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We're mocked for believing that the second person of that Godhead became a man, died, rose, and is coming back for us. We're mocked for believing that water saves us and bread and wine can be our Lord's own body and blood.

Such mockery has been more than just pointing and laughing, but it's also led to Christians getting punished and even killed. The world doesn't like the Church because we're so different, and so, the world wants to rid itself of the Church. This is seen all over the world today, in places like China, India, North Korea, Iran, and Nigeria.

But for us Christians in America, it seems we often do all that we can to avoid the world's mockery. We're afraid of being labeled, and so we don't want to talk about what we believe. We leave our faith inside the safe walls of the church and very rarely let out the little secret that we're Lutheran, let alone Christian. It's not discussed at work, with our friends at a barbeque, or even at home with our family. In essence, we're ashamed of the Gospel of Christ.

Repent. You are baptized in the blood of the Lamb, consecrated and set apart by God and for God. You're different. As St. Peter wrote, "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people" (1 Peter 2:9).

You are God's people, and that makes you different. You're not normal. You're weird. You're strange. You believe and think differently than the world. You talk differently. You act differently. You love what the world hates. You forgive while the world holds grudges. You sacrifice when the world is selfish. You are as Christ is, and Christ is very different from the world. As the Church, we look different from everyone else. We sing strange music. We have buildings that stick out from the crowd. We preach a foreign message of mercy and undeserved compassion while the world preaches fairness and toleration for sin.

You are different. Don't be ashamed of that. Embrace it. Confess the name of Jesus among your co-workers and friends, and especially with your family. Don't be ashamed to be different but know that in Christ, we are one. If the world hates you, remember that it first hated Jesus. Be different, because Jesus is different. He gives a peace which this world cannot give. And that peace is worth the mockery.

QUESTIONS ABOUT THE LITURGY

Why do we cross ourselves?



Making the sign of the cross is something Christians have most likely done since the time of the apostles. It is in no way an exclusively “Catholic thing,” but, in fact, Martin Luther himself instructs us to do this in his Small Catechism: “In the morning when you get up, make the sign of the holy cross and say: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.” Making such a sign is a reminder that you are baptized into the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, marked with his blessed cross, branded with his holy name, and forever claimed as a child of God. St. Paul instructs us to “put on the breastplate of righteousness,” which is none other than the cross of Christ, wherein his righteousness was given to sinners. To make the sign of the cross is to confess: “I belong to Jesus.”

There are certain times you can make the sign of the cross during the Divine Service. An easy way to remember when is simply to do it whenever the pastor makes the cross over you and the congregation or whenever the hymnal instructs you to do so with this symbol ✝.

Here are some additional opportunities in the Divine Service when you can make the sign of the cross:

- **Invocation.** At the beginning of the Divine Service, the name of the Holy Trinity is invoked, as we, the baptized, begin in the same way it all began for us at the baptismal font. We make the sign of the cross to remember that very fact: I am baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- **“...and the life of the world to come.”** Every time a Christian speaks one of the Church’s three creeds, it is a confession of Holy Baptism. The Triune God into whom we were baptized is the same one we confess in the Creed. Therefore, it is appropriate to make the sign of the cross at the last line of the Creed as a reminder that this confession is not our own but one given to us as the baptized, and as the baptized, we have the promise of the life of the world to come.
- **“Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord!”** During the Sanctus, we sing the same words the people cried out as our Lord Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. We welcome him into our church, as he rides in on bread and wine in the Holy Communion. He comes in the name of the Lord, the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. That same name has been made ours in Baptism. Like the Invocation, we make the sign of the holy cross to remember just that.
- **“But deliver us from evil.”** The sign of the cross may also be made for the final petition of the Lord’s Prayer, a prayer for the baptized. This petition of deliverance from the devil was finished in the death of Christ. We remind ourselves with the making of the holy cross that the devil can’t touch us. He’s judged; the deed is done.
- **Holy Communion.** It is also appropriate to make the sign of the cross as you receive the Lord’s Supper. That which you eat and drink is the same body given and the same blood shed from our Lord’s cross for your salvation. You partake of this meal because you are baptized into Christ and are now fed by him.

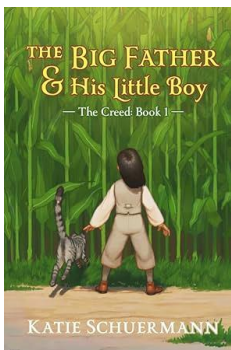

by Katie Schuermann, illustrated by Jesse Cordes

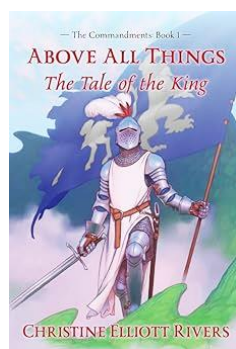

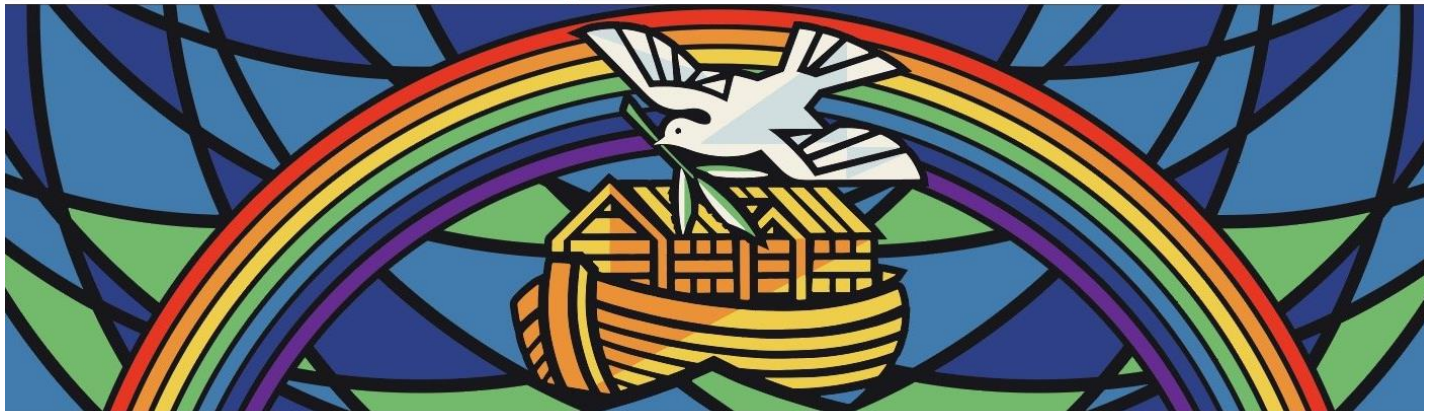

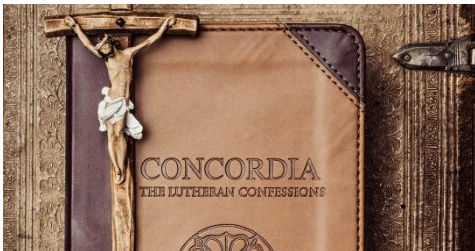
SUNDAY SCHOOL AND ADULT BIBLE STUDY

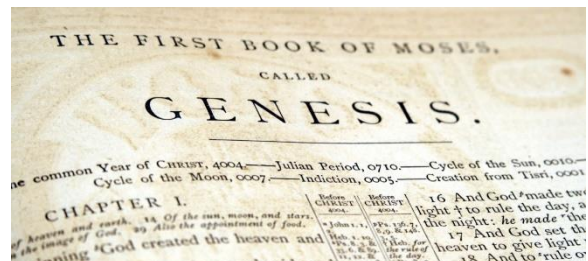
