

## THE EMPTY TOMB OF JESUS

*And the angel said to them, "Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here. See the place where they laid him."*

—Mark 16:6

God loved us by dying for us. He allowed himself to be betrayed, arrested, unlawfully convicted and then crucified. The one who breathed life into Adam in the beginning gave up his final breath on the cross. The Light of the World became cold and dark. God died.

And then, he was buried. His body was taken down from the cross, and Joseph of Arimathea wrapped him in a linen shroud and placed him in a new tomb. The stone was rolled over the entrance of that grave to put the final nail in the coffin. Just as all of us will one day die and be buried, so also the Almighty One, he who is above all things, died and was buried. He was locked away in a cave, seemingly never to come out again. As Paul Gerhardt's hymn tells us: "You lay the One into the grave Who built the earth's foundation" (LSB 438:3).

God loved us by being buried *with* us. He subjected himself to not only death, but also burial. You usually bury something, because it no longer serves a purpose. Like throwing garbage into a dumpster, a body must be dealt with to avoid the stench of death. Jesus was soon to rot and stink. God's body no longer served a purpose, and so he was buried.

But, Jesus' burial was different. It was only temporary. God was dead but not for long. Jesus was bruised but not broken. The very large stone was rolled back. The linens were folded neatly. The stench of death was replaced with the lilies of the garden. He who once was dead was alive again!

And now, because Jesus' burial was so different, so will ours be. Having been crucified with Christ in the waters of Holy Baptism, we have been joined to him in his death and resurrection. As St. Paul writes, "We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:4-5).



Someday, our graves will also be sealed, just as the stone was rolled over Jesus' tomb. Our bodies will decay and stink. We will be lifeless and dark.

And yet, it won't last for very long. Our rest in the ground will only be temporary. We'll be bruised but not broken. We will rise, because Jesus lives. What happened to our Lord on Easter Sunday will also happen to us. We, the perishable, will put on the imperishable, and we, the mortal, will put on immortality. We will rise to never die again, just as it is written:

“Death is swallowed up in victory.”

“O death, where is your victory?

O death, where is your sting?” (1 Corinthians 15:54b-55)

Death is dead. The devil has lost. Sins are forgiven. All that would put us in our graves forever has been defeated by our Lord Jesus. He has put all such things under his feet and will stand on top of them forever. They cannot harm us. Death cannot keep us. The devil cannot imprison us. We are free.

You will be buried in the ground not because your body no longer serve a purpose, but because such a body is, in fact, the Lord's treasure. In your narrow chamber, he keeps you safe until his reappearing when you will see your Savior and your Fount of Grace.

The tomb of Jesus is empty, which means that one day your tomb will be empty, for Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Every month, as a congregation, we will have a Bible verse to memorize, so that together the word of Christ may dwell richly in our hearts. Here is April's Bible verse:

**“Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem” (Luke 24:46-47).**



Holy Week is indeed holy, that is, it's different from every other week of the year. It's been set apart for us Christians to observe our Lord's passion, his death and resurrection. From Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, we join the Son of God, who is rejected and despised, crucified and buried. His week becomes our week. I can't encourage you enough to take advantage of each day during Holy Week to be in the Lord's house. Don't allow this to be just another normal week in your life, but keep it holy. Here's what you can expect:

**PALM SUNDAY:** We begin in the fellowship hall to hear the Evangelist John's account of our Lord's procession into Jerusalem. The children lead us into the sanctuary with palm branches, as we sing "All Glory, Laud and Honor." The service shifts then to focus on our Lord's passion, as we will hear it from Matthew's Gospel.

**HOLY MONDAY, TUESDAY, AND WEDNESDAY:** Each of these services begin at 6:30 pm and are spoken only, with the exception of one hymn. On Monday, our Lord tells us "the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified" (John 12:23). We see such glory in his saving death on a cross, as we hear of it on Tuesday in the Passion from St. Mark and on Wednesday in the Passion from St. Luke.

**MAUNDY THURSDAY:** This day begins the Triduum (meaning "three days"), a single service that starts on Thursday at 6:30 pm, continues through Friday, and ends on Saturday night. Maundy comes from a Latin word in which we get the English word "mandate." This is the night our Lord celebrates the Passover and institutes the Holy Communion. In the Gospel of John, he has a major discourse with his disciples that night in the upper room, covering five whole chapters. We hear only a snippet of it, in which he gives the disciples and us a new mandate: "Just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another" (John 13:34). At the conclusion of the service, the altar is stripped as the congregation and choir sing from Psalm 22, just as Jesus prayed this psalm from the cross.

**GOOD FRIDAY:** This is a good day, the day of all days, the best day in the history of the world. This is the day we are saved from our sins. At 1 o'clock, we gather for the Chief Service when we will hear again of our Lord's passion, this time from John's Gospel. The choir leads us in our plea for God's mercy. The wooden cross is carried in and placed at the foot of the altar. As it's been handed out every day this week, we receive the body given and the blood shed from the cross. At 6:30 pm, we get an additional service called Tenebrae (meaning "darkness"). We follow the Stations of the Cross on the south wall of the sanctuary, taking us from our Lord's trial to his burial. Every candle is extinguished until the church is in utter darkness with only the single Christ candle left to shine.

**HOLY SATURDAY:** This is the end of the Triduum and the beginning of Easter. We start in darkness, just as we left on Good Friday. A new fire is lit that leads us into the sanctuary. We hear of the Old Testament accounts which Christ fulfilled. We are reminded of our Baptism and pray the Litany before the lights are turned on and our celebration of the resurrection begins. All of the veils and coverings are removed and the color gold adorns our altar. Many area congregations are invited to join us for this night, as their pastors participate in the service.

**EASTER SUNDAY:** Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Breakfast at 8 am. The Divine Service at 9:15 am.

# WHY?

## QUESTIONS ABOUT THE LITURGY

### Why is the paschal candle lit only during Easter?

The word *pachal* comes from the Hebrew word for the Passover and also has its root from a word meaning "to suffer." Paschal has also been used by the Christian Church as another name for Easter. And so, the paschal candle in our sanctuary can rightfully be called the Easter Candle. This candle intentionally stands next to the baptismal font, where a sinner is joined to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ, so that all who are baptized are killed, buried, and raised up. What takes place in those waters is what took place on Good Friday through Easter Sunday.

Because of this, the paschal candle is only lit during the season of Easter, beginning on Holy Saturday during the Easter Vigil, when we transition from darkness to light, from the cross to the empty tomb. At that service, the candle is blessed with a new fire, just as our hearts are rekindled with the fire of God's love that we might be prepared to share in the Feast of Light which has no end.

This candle remains lit throughout the season of Easter, which lasts for forty days, coinciding with the days our Lord appeared to his disciples after his resurrection. At the end of those forty days, our Lord was taken from their sight, as he joined himself to the power and glory of his Father. Although he could no longer be seen, he was still with his Church always to the very end of the age (Matthew 28:20), even as he is with us now through his Word and Sacrament. And so, on the day of Ascension, the paschal candle is extinguished, not signifying that Christ has "left the building," but that he is no longer visible. If Christ had completely abandoned us then we would have to remove the candle, but we don't. He is with his Church on earth through the preached Word, the waters of Baptism, and his body and blood on the altar.

The paschal candle remains unlit until the following Easter, except when there is a Baptism or funeral, the beginning and end of every Christian life here on earth. Again, Holy Baptism is a death and resurrection, just as a funeral is used to proclaim the resurrection for all those who die in Christ, knowing that "just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4).

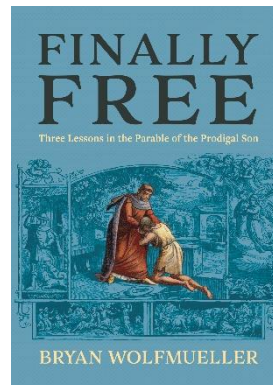

### Finally Free

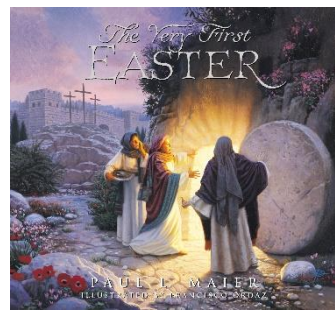
by Rev. Bryan Wolfmueller
